Dear Santa,



I am not writing to ask for anything for myself, but on behalf of a wonderful non-profit organization, St. Ioseph Lincoln Senior Service Center. The Senior Center provides numerous exercise classes, a Circuit Training Room, arts and crafts activities, including the newly opened Wood Shop, several card/board

games, a Computer Lab, Library, transportation and several monthly programs. The Staff provides excellent service to the seniors in our area.

Last year, our membership grew about 11%. Just last month, we gained 111 new members. According to the last Census, Berrien County's age group of 65 and over is the fastest growing age group and increased 4.5% in 3 years. A Purdue University study predicts the number of those age 65+ in Michigan will double in the next 5 years. (Thanks to our Executive Director, Cindi, for providing the statistics). The funds we receive from the county millage only covers about 84% of our fiscal budget.

Due to this upswing in our membership, future plans need to be addressed.

This is our wish list:

* Additional fundraising. Currently, we have 7 members comprised of past and current Board Members on our Fundraising Committee. More volunteers are needed to assist the current committee. With our large membership, there must be people with fundraising experience. Fresh ideas and additional manpower is needed for this committee.

Dear Santa ...

- Our BIGGEST wish is finding an experienced grant writer. Since our membership is growing, we must plan for the future. When we have our summer picnic or Christmas party, we have limited space. Therefore, we will need to either have an addition to our existing building or a separate building. We are fortunate to have the space for expansion. Finding grants to provide additional income would be a start to establishing a building fund for a future expansion.
- Our next wish is to have members to consider providing a legacy gift to the Center. Remembering the Center in their estate planning could provide future income. Please refer to page 6 of the newsletter on ways to provide donations to the Center. This year, the Circuit Training Room reaped the benefits of a memorial donation. A new piece of equipment was obtained due to the family selecting the Senior Center and designating the Circuit Training Room fund to receive donations in memory of their loved one.

Santa, I know our wishes are large, but the service that is provided enriches the lives of the seniors in our area. Diligent work by the Staff, Board Members and Volunteers will continue, but we could use some financial assistance.

SHOPPING SAFETY TIPS FOR THE HOLIDAYS



It's that time of the year again when you'll be out and about searching for those perfect gifts for your loved ones. Beware and be safe. Below

are some tips to keep you safe while shopping.

- Try not to carry a lot of cash. Stealing someone's debit or credit card takes extra work. That's why cash is so attractive to thieves. If cash is all you have, keep it in a wallet in your front pocket.
- * Dress down. Dress comfortably and leave the jewelry at home. This will take a thief's focus off of you.
- * Avoid using ATMs. Try to use one or the other - cards or cash. Using ATMs can put you in a vulnerable position, not to mention the risk of card skimmers.
- * Walk with your head high. This will help you have better awareness of your surroundings and keep you safer.
- Keep your purse close. Keep it in front of you instead of behind. If you're keeping it in a car, make sure the purse is closest to you, zipped or buttoned closed, and attach it to the cart if possible.
- * If you are missing a credit card, notify your bank immediately.
- Put your purchases in the trunk. Out of sight, out of mind. Leaving your purchases visible only increases your risk of theft.
- Find your car keys before walking to your vehicle.
- Lock your car doors the moment you get inside. Yes, even before you buckle up!
