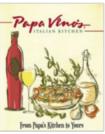
HEALTHY EATS

From Snow to Sunshine: A Journey Through Michigan's Fruitful Seasons



Did you know that Michigan is ranked among the top 10 states in the U.S. for fruit and production? vegetable Michigan's total agricultural production is valued nearly \$580 million with roughly \$362 million in total fruit production and \$217 million in total vegetable News, Commodity.com).

Michigan's ability to be one of the major fruit-growing states is due in large part to the lake-effect climate. This unique effect of the Great Lakes helps to moderate seasonal temperatures, which creates favorable conditions for production of fruits that are typically grown much further south. Additionally, because of glacial processes in Michigan's deep geological history, the state's fertile shelves that my husband had built for me in our soils have ideal combinations of sand, silt and clay basement cellar. that are perfect for growing fruits and vegetables.

I remember when I first arrived in Southwest Michigan many years ago in the deep chill of January. I marveled at the white snow and how everything seems frozen in the quiet stillness of winter. This was quite a shift from the tropical island in the Pacific that I had moved from. But what a surprise when spring arrived, and the white snow-covered landscape magically transformed into lush hues of green. It was a wonder to observe seemingly dead and dormant trees sprout leaves and bloom blossoms, some of which would transform into beautiful and delicious fruits.

I quickly discovered that Michigan has specific peak harvest seasons for a rich cornucopia of fruits and vegetables, and the joy of exploring local farmers' markets, roadside produce stands, and you-pick farms. As an avid cook and baker, I was inspired to try new kitchen creations and share these with my family and friends.

I also learned how to preserve the deliciousness of Michigan's bounty through the art of canning. It took hours, and even days, to complete this process, but the reward for this work was that we could enjoy the fruits of my labor long after summer had ended and the cold months had returned. I loved canning so much that my husband had to build special shelving in the basement cellar. Later, I bought a steamer to make homemade grape juice, which I also sealed in jars and placed on the shelves in the cellar.

To this day, the grape juice that I made in my kitchen steamer, from grapes that I picked myself, is the best and purest I have ever had.

As someone who had spent her childhood as a city girl, I had never imagined the fun I would have hand-selecting fresh produce and developing such a great affection for the hobby of canning. My mom was surprised when I phoned her to share my excitement for canning. Initially, she wondered if I was running low on money and volunteered to send me some cash. I assured her that my canning hobby was not evidence of financial desperation, but a production (Fruit Growers | source of joy. She was not fully convinced until I sent her a jar of my homemade grape juice. After one sip she understood that the goodness of what I had created in my kitchen was not something that could be purchased at the grocery store.

> Although I do not do as much canning these days, I do fondly remember the immense sense of accomplishment I felt when I gazed at the rows of my homemade canned goods neatly arranged on

> Michigan's harvest season starts in May rhubarb, followed by sweet cherries strawberries in June. In July, we can expect apricots, blueberries, peaches, and raspberries. August brings blackberries, cantaloupe, honeydew melon, cherries. nectarines, pears, watermelons, and cranberries. Lastly, September sees the arrival of apples and grapes.

> My husband and I still enjoy driving through the countryside to visit fruit orchards, admire the flowers, appreciate the fragrance of vineyards, and snap photos. With the convertible top down, the wind against our skin, and the warmth of the sun shining down, we feel like we are in our twenties again. As excellent sources of essential vitamins, minerals, high fiber, and a variety of health-boosting antioxidants, locally grown fruits and vegetables should be part of everyone's diet so you too can feel fit, healthy, and young!

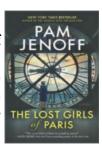
