
VOLUNTEER - To volunteer means to freely offer up your time and service to help!

To shine, Senior Center members use resistance and aerobics training in our exercise rooms to keep their health strong. They are improving their strength conditioning so carrying the groceries into one's home, vacuuming/shampooing the carpet or taking the garbage out and the trash bin to the curb aren't troublesome. Having the inability to complete normal activities each day can provide the motivation to begin an exercise routine that keeps a senior body strong and ready to shine whenever called upon.

Another great year for fitness awaits inside the Senior Center exercise rooms! Eight "state of the art" MATRIX resistance machines were recently installed. Shoulder Press, Chest Press, Leg Curl, Leg Extension, Leg Press, Lat Pull Down, Ab & Low Back and to strengthen balance, Hip Abduction. There's an expanded Cardio area too, plus a new room with Free Weights, Bands, Kettle Bell, Medicine Ball and body weight exercises. A stretching section has been added with a True Stretch Cage that's effective for activities like Golfing, Cycling, Paddle Sports, Yoga, Tai Chi and traditional exercise. Monitors are on duty full time in each area so whenever you have a question your Monitor will have the answer.

exercise facility opens for your enjoyment. Closing is at 3 pm. To join, a Monitor will sign you up for 30 minutes of free orientation training.

April's warmer temperatures encourages Senior Center members to move their fitness activities outside. Just off the rear parking areas, a resurfaced Outdoor Fitness Zone offers 12 body weight resistance pieces that can be enjoyed by 24 people at one time and is accessible to wheel chairs. There's plenty of fresh air available out there along with the exercises of your choice. A canopy covers the entire zone so you can stay out of the sun and remain cool while burning calories. The Outdoor Fitness Zone is always open.



station makes building and toning deltoids efficient and comfortable. An independent converging movement provides a natural path of motion, while counterbalanced pressing arms optimize resistance. 
SJLSSC LIBRARY



WOOD SHOP INFORMATION

Below is some general information about how our Wood Shop operates. For more details please call or stop at the front desk.

CURRENT HOURS/DAYS OF OPERATION Monday-Friday 9:00 am-3:00 pm

To use the Wood Shop, you must be a current member of SILSSC and make an appointment to sign up for a mandatory Safety Orientation Class, which are on Wednesdays only. You can make an appointment for orientation at the front desk, which is approximately 3 hours. You need to sign up 2 business days in advance to attend an orientation. The cost of our Wood Shop orientation is \$20. This fee will include a 1-month membership, which will start on the 1st business day after the orientation. Also included for this price is a project, which will include all materials to be completed during your first month. Safety glasses are mandatory. If you do not have a pair, you can purchase them at the front desk; \$2 for regular safety glasses and \$5 for glasses that fit over a prescription.

To use the Wood Shop after orientation, you need to have an active Wood Shop membership and sign all membership documents. All fees are to be paid at the front desk before you can use the Wood Shop.

Wood Shop Member Payment Plans

- \$5 daily fee
- * \$20 monthly fee
- * \$30 monthly fee for couples
- \$200 yearly fee or \$300 yearly fee for couples.





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
